Public attitudes towards fishing quota allocation in Spain

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Background

The present poll aimed to find out Spanish citizens' views about the importance of preserving a healthy ocean and how they feel about current fishing quota allocation practices and criteria and if they would support or not more quotas to fleets with a lower environmental impact and offering more societal benefits for coastal communities.

Objectives

The study focused around 4 main objectives:

- 1) Do Spanish citizens care about the marine environment and want it to be in a better state?
- 2) Do they think that the impact of the fishing boat on the ocean and the amount of jobs the boat creates are important factors to consider when allocating fishing quotas to fishers?
- 3) Do Spanish citizens think that certain fishers should get more quotas over others, and if so, what factors are important?
- 4) Do they want their government to grant them more access to information on how they distribute fishing quotas to their fleets?

METHODOLOGY





Format: Online interviews, conducted on YouGov's panel

Dates: 4th – 7th April

Men and women, of legal age (18+), residents









KEY HIGHLIGHTS

• 87% of citizens believe the Spanish government should give more quotas to small-scale fishers and 78% believe they should give fewer to industrial vessels to better support coastal communities and local economies.

- Citizens support such a re-distribution of quotas because it would support local seafood, protect jobs and protect the ocean.
- 83% of Spanish citizens want their government to provide easier access to clear information about the criteria, methodology, and decisions regarding fishing quota distribution. 85% of Spanish citizens believe that small-scale fishers should have a greater role in decision-making regarding government quota distribution.
- The overwhelming majority of Spanish citizens (96%) believe it is important to protect the ocean, with 62% considering it essential.
- 89% of Spanish citizens acknowledge that small-scale traditional fishers often use gear with a minimal impact on marine ecosystems and that is therefore compatible with a healthy ocean while 76% consider unselective and destructive fishing methods like bottom trawling to be incompatible with preserving the ocean's health.
- 79% of Spaniards believe that the impact of fishing boats on ocean habitats and the amount of unwanted fish caught should be
 prioritized when distributing fishing quotas and 69% believe that the amount of jobs the boat creates and the importance of the
 fishing activity for the coastal community should also be a priority.

96% OF SPANISH CITIZENS THINK IT'S IMPORTANT TO PROTECT THE OCEAN, and 62% would even say it's essential




How important, or not, is for you protecting the ocean and making it in a better state? Base (1007)






89% of Spanish citizens believe that small-scale fishing is more compatible with a healthy ocean than industrial fishing.

The majority of Spanish citizens believe that unselective and destructive fishing is incompatible with a healthy ocean.




To what extent do you agree or disagree that destructive and unselective fishing methods, like bottom trawling, are incompatible with preserving a healthy ocean?





The majority of citizens polled believe that the Spanish government should give more quotas to small-scale fishers and fewer quotas to industrial vessels

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


Providing local seafood, protecting local jobs, and protecting the ocean are the reasons why the vast majority of Spaniards support more quotas for small-scale fishers



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
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Most Spanish citizens believe that the way the government gives out fishing quotas is not fair


